Slightly Foxed

The front Books, cards, gifts displayed impeccably in a bright, uncluttered space. A revolving selection of modern paperbacks upstairs and an absorbing stock of second-hand hardbacks on a range of subjects downstairs. Place smells like a new book – previously a second-hand bookshop run by Graham Greene's nephew, it was taken over by literary quarterly *Slightly Foxed* and reopened officially on March 22.

The angle A hand-picked selection of new and old books – good for presents for bookworms. High brow, so no Dan Brown or celeb biogs – but there are £1 bargain books outside.

The clientele A loyal set of regular customers, mainly well-read, well-shod shoppers and students of Knightsbridge and Kensington.

The skinny Knowledgeable, passionate employees, some of whom have been selling books since the early '80s. They know their second-hand collection and can also have the latest bestseller delivered overnight on request. Not merely bookish staff – shop assistant Jane McMorland Hunter is a published author.

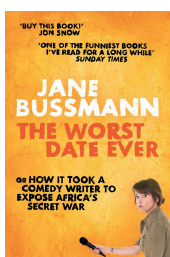

Paperback pick 'The Worst Date Ever' by Jane Bussmann

A comedy based in an African war zone? An unlikely topic that doesn't exactly strike as a must-write, let alone must-read. But comedian/journalist Jane Bussmann proves her skill

as a writer in this travelogue that gets off to a hilarious start with the tale of how she ended up in war-torn Uganda after acting on a reckless whim.

Bussmann fled north London in the early noughties and headed for the neon lights of LA intending to hit the big time as a movie writer but wound up as a celebrity journalist. Bussmann, exhausted chasing actors'

agents, fabricating quotes and lying about meeting stars, years to leave the Magic Kingdom and join the Useful People. When she develops a ridiculous crush on former White House director of African affairs, John Prendergast – a man whose 'day job it is to end war. In Africa' – she jets to Uganda in pursuit of her prey, and to write a Sunday supplement feature on him, of course.

Bussmann is irreverent and wittingly self-deprecating, especially when writing about her own trials: Prendergast being delayed in America, her laptop and camera being robbed, a bad case of the runs, eight-hour bus rides to the ATM. Comedy and conflict in Africa might sound like a tricky marriage, but this is a very amusing page-turner which also portrays an Africa you never read about in the foreign-news pages. *Kathryn Miller*
